
Our October program is *Maintaining Order on the Open Waters of our Great Lakes* presented by **Richard ("Dick") H. Buchanan,** P/C Bob's brother. Dick's career was in plant management for General Motors. Following retirement from GM, his avocation and passion became writing about our majestic Great Lakes. Dick is a staff writer for Great Lakes Pilot, a periodical devoted to the Lakes area. Readers enjoy his charismatic and often amusing style; for example his article describing our Bristol Bay Cruise was titled "A most unusual classroom."

Dick has accepted a writing assignment from the USCG's Sector Soo which incorporates Vessel Traffic Service (VTS) at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, known to boaters as "Soo Traffic." Dick plans to include a discussion of the role of VTS in safety and the importance to the Great Lakes economy.

The Ann Arbor News headline story for July 5, 2018 read "643 people drowned in the Great Lakes since 2010. 637 did not wear life vests." In other words, essentially none of the drowning victims wore Personal Floatation Devices (PFDs). The data was collected by the Great Lakes Surf Rescue Project. The data collected includes only the open waters of the Great Lakes, not river or inland lake events.

Lake Michigan consistently reports the highest proportion of drowning, about 46%. Although the number decreased in 2014 and 2015, the Project attributed this to an unusually cool summer.

Overall, the annual number of drowning has increased from 2010 to 2017 in spite of educational programs. At the federal level, the U.S. Bureau of Transportation has reported that PFDs were not worn in 89% of drownings. Further, the number keeps increasing each year.

The Michigan regulations are clear, do not need to be repeated here. A PFD 1) must be in good condition and 2) must be readily available. During our sailing days on the open waters of Lake St. Clair, Jeannine and I always held an instruction section with an examination if we had friends aboard regardless of whether they had previously sailed with us. Boating accidents give all of us a bad name.

Finally, Jeannine and I have sailed the North Channel, Lake St. Clair, Caribbean waters for almost 20 years. Although we had many interesting moments, usually my fault, we never had an emergency due to a complete commitment to safety.



Why have a USPS squadron in Ann Arbor? To offer the great courses that USPS volunteers have developed. The navigation and weather courses are really fun to take and teach. I suspect that those USPS members that want to dissolve their squadrons have not experienced the vicarious pleasures of taking the really fun USPS courses -- Celestial Navigation and Weather. USPS is getting a little frayed around the edges but there is still lots of power and good potential at the core.



The USPS Navigators course is a fun course. It teaches celestial sights of the sun, stars, planets, ocean passage planning with a program called" Visual Passage Planner 2" (VPP2) and free digital ocean charts with OpenCPN, The example above shows VPP2 for a passage from Hawaii to Washington and a report of the distants and sailing conditions for a heavy 45' sailboat. For a fun, vicarious, experience take the USPS Navigators Class. The class requires internet access.
