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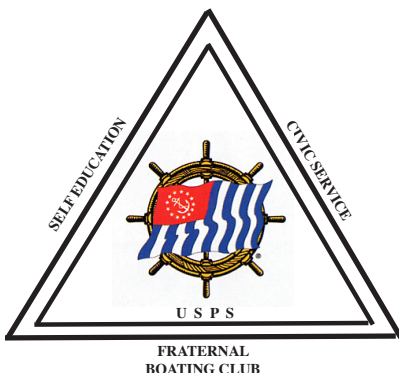

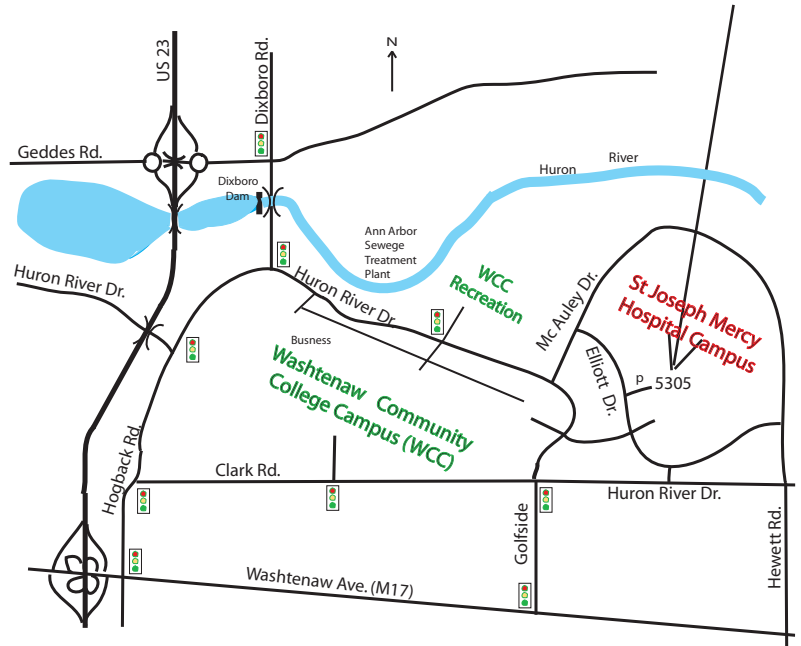

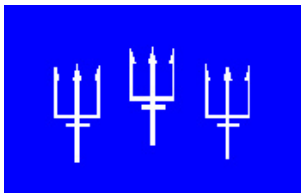

Commander's Message

Somewhere in the distant past I heard that if a frog is put in a pot of cold water and the water is gradually warmed that the frog will not realize the danger, and the frog will not jump out of the pot and will end up cooked. The same idea applies to inflation. This insidious fact of life is always with us. We kind of get used to the cost of things always going up. One example is the cost of gasoline. In 1950 a gallon of leaded gas was about thirty cents. Factoring in the cost of inflation at the reported rate of 3.76%, the cost of the 1950 gallon of gasoline in 2011 dollars would be \$2.75. (Note that the cost of food and fuel has been taken out of the official inflation rate calculator, so if using the "old" inflation rate the 1950 cost in present dollars would be a lot more.) So, the present cost of gasoline is not terribly out of line with the general increase in the cost of living. We have even become accustomed to \$3 a gallon gasoline! I expect the cost of gasoline will go up a lot faster in the next few years, not only because of inflation, but because of political factors such as the turmoil in the Middle East.

Gasoline at \$4 a gallon seems really expensive to us because we have become accustomed to "cheap" gas. In Europe (because of taxes and other factors) gasoline has been at \$4 -\$5 a gallon or more for a long time.

There are so many wonderful benefits to boating and being out on the water that we should not let the cost of fuel paralyze us into being land lubbers! We have to make choices on how to spend our precious dollars. Fuel costs more. Ok, accept it and move on! In the great scheme of things the cost of fuel should not prohibit us from doing what we love. Let's Go Boating!

People argue about "global warming" but here in southeastern Lower Michigan this winter has been anything but warm. We have had more than our fair share of cold and snow this winter. My wife Marlene and I are skiers, so we enjoy snow sports. But –ENOUGH IS ENOUGH ALREADY. We are ready for spring!

Our Change of Watch was postponed until March 14, 2011 because of a heavy snow that came just before the scheduled date. Part of the reason for the change is that our district representative, D/L/C Mary Ann Jensen was coming from Lansing for the Change of Watch. We felt that it was an unnecessary burden to put on her to drive all that way in inclement weather. This is an opportunity for all AASPS members that could not make the old date to put the new date on their calendar and come out and support the squadron. In addition, we can meet and greet Mary Ann who will be the new District Nine Commander!

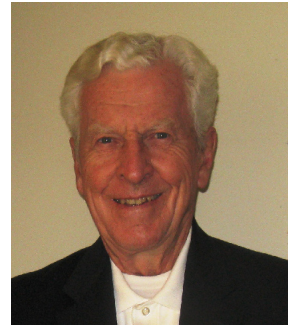

Secretary's Message

Although the lakes are still frozen, March is one of my favorite months for marine activities. Due to the relatively cold weather, we can expect ice to flow down Lake Huron into the St. Clair River resulting in ice jams clogging the river. The very worst jams seem to occur in the Algonac stretch, often extending right to the bottom.

The Soo Locks open for commerce March 25th. This means that lake carriers which operate on a tight schedule need to traverse the river shortly after this opening date but must make passage through the ice jams. Therefore the US and Canadian Coast Guards must move icebreakers into the area. This could include the USCG Mackinaw, or the Canadian Samuel Risley and Griffon, plus the smaller USCG 140' bay-class ice breakers. Our favorite place to watch and hear the icebreakers lead the freighters through the ice is at Algonac State Park. In fact, the ice breaking is clearly audible. The area is controlled by Sarnia Traffic on Channel 11 but the freighters and icebreakers communicate on Channel 6.

You will need your radio scanner, camera, and warm clothes. We have sat in a small restaurant opposite Algonac State Park at a window table, watching the activity across the road with our scanner on Channel 6. This was a glorious way to enjoy a leisurely lunch.

Information about when this starts can be found at www.boatnerd.com Then open the News Channel. The present information found in the News Channel is that we can expect a really busy icebreaking season due to the cold weather and shifting winds. In fact, the St. Clair River is frozen now, so I imagine that the ice breakers will soon be getting their engines warmed.

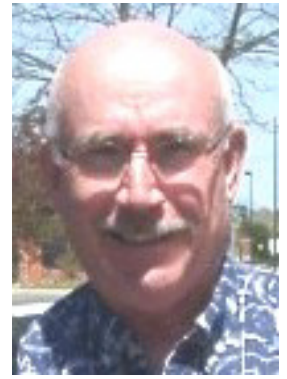

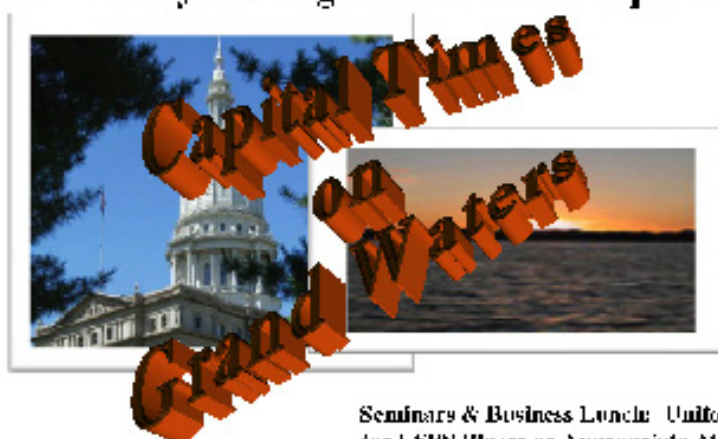
