



Speaker: Erika Jensen

Com. John Barr, AP, Life






I believe that, for those to whom much has been given, much is expected. So, we in the USA and USPS, and AASPS have been given much, and much is expected. Are we living up to this ideal?

23 foot wave sets record at Lake Michigan's south buoy!

(Grand Rapids Press 9/30/11)

Holland — A 23 foot wave was recorded by the Lake Michigan mid-lake southern buoy today — the highest reading since readings began 1981.

The buoy, about 50 miles west –southwest of Holland, takes readings from March into November each year before being shut down for the winter. The previous record was a 20.3 foot wave recorded November 1998. The wave was recorded at 4 a.m. with a wind speed of 51 mph, gusting to over 60 mph!

In southern Michigan, some nearshore waves topped 17 feet. The buoy off Bridgman, near Warren Dunes State Park, recorded a peak of wave 17.6 feet.



Secretary's Message Lt/C Robert Buchanan, P



Nine students are making excellent progress in the *American's Boating Course* underway at WCC. The teaching faculty includes SEO Ron Schwartz, EO Frank Hoy, and Dr. Larry Marentette with Jeannine Buchanan providing logistical support. A review of the USPS Website shows that not all District 9 squadrons present the 12 hour navigation version of the ABC course. The AASPS course is the full 12 hour program with electronic navigation. Actually we at AASPS require 14 to 16 hours for completion (perhaps the course director is slow!). One result of teaching the 12 hour course is that the new USPS 800 system prints "Introduction to Coastal and Inland Navigation Endorsement" on the USPS Certificate of Completion. This certificate is recognized by the US Coast Guard.

SEO Ron and I are certified Michigan DNR instructors so that we can give students the Michigan certification examination and issue the Michigan Boating Safety Certificate as part of the course. Three students are taking the course because they operate power boats in Ontario where all power boat operators need to have certification. Environment Canada recognizes the Michigan Certificate as meeting this recent Canadian requirement. In summary, AASPS is presenting a valuable program.

This fall has not been a good month for marine safety in Michigan. The USCG website described a 47 year old male who slipped on the deck of his Bayliner tied up in Betsie Bay (Frankfort area), fell into cold water and did not survive. Ann Arbor.com described a boatload of 2 adults and 3 children who went out in Saginaw Bay in rough seas and capsized. The outcome is unknown. Whether they were wearing PFDs is also not described in the report.

These events fortify the continued need for boater education.
