




P/D/C Allen F. Harold, SN

SS Daniel J. Morrell

Bob Buchanan and I have been discussing, recently, about why these long Great Lakes ships sink in November storms. I think it happens when a part of the ship is raised up by a high wave, leaving other parts of the ship partially supported by water. The hull experiences tremendous stresses and breaks.

SS Daniel J. Morrell broke in two November 29, 1966, in a storm on Lake Huron, near Harbor Beach, with the aft section coming to rest five miles from the bow at about 43.850°N 82.590°W. I heard a talk from the only survivor, Dennis Hale. He was in his bunk and heard a loud crack. He grabbed his life jacket, and Peacoat and ran up on deck. When the ship went down he swam to a life raft. Three others were on it. The other three died. They were washed up on shore in the life raft near Harbor Beach. A coastguard helicopter arrived and Dennis survived. Dennis Hale died recently.

This month's speaker at our General Meeting will be U. S. Coast Guard Operations Petty Officer Daniel Nofziger, and Rescue Swimmer Will Lawson, talking about rescue at sea. Even If you never need the Coast Guard to rescue, you this program will be of interest. See page 3. I hope to see you at our November meeting.

Secretary's Comments, The Gales of November

Everyone knows the story of the *Edmund Fitzgerald*. The Fitzgerald cleared Superior, Wisconsin on her last trip on November 9, 1975, with a cargo of taconite for Detroit, under the command of Captain Ernest McSorley. During the night, she passed the slower *Arthur M. Anderson* belonging to U.S. Steel Corporation that had left Two Harbors under the command of Captain Jesse "Bernie" Cooper. Due to worsening weather, both captains decided to take the northern route down Lake Superior, i.e. hugging the Canadian shoreline. As conditions further deteriorated during the afternoon of November 10, 1975, Captain Mc Sorley reported that he had lost both radars and had a "bad list." He then radioed that he was slowing down so that the *Anderson* could give him radar guidance because the radio beacons at both Whitefish Point and Grand Marias failed due to the storm.

The last communication from the *Fitzgerald* came at approximately 7:10 p.m., when the *Anderson* notified the *Fitzgerald* of an upbound ship and asked how she was doing. McSorley reported, "We are holding our own." A blinding snow squall developed but suddenly it cleared and the *Fitzgerald* had disappeared from sight (47° North Latitude, 85° 7' West Longitude). Captain Cooper then made his famous radio call to Sault Ste Marie Control; "I am very concerned about the welfare of the steamer *Edmund Fitzgerald*." The *Anderson* subsequently joined in the search by Ford Motor Company's *William Clay Ford* but all efforts failed to find any survivors. All 29 officers and crew, including a Great Lakes Maritime Academy cadet, went down with the ship, which lies broken in two sections in 530 feet of water.

But this is not the end of our story. The late Patricia Norton, the daughter of a lighthouse keeper, was a selftaught artist who painted scenes along the lower St. Mary's River. Her studio was located close to the Neebish Island ferry dock above Rock Cut. She was perhaps the premier Great Lakes marine watercolor artist. Following the loss of the *Edmund Fitzgerald*, she painted her single most outstanding work. A photograph of a print of this painting is attached. Notice that the *Anderson*, left foreground, is alive with birds in flight, her green sidelight displayed. But the *Fitzgerald*, top right is dead with only a brilliant white light above the mast.

The original painting was hung over the fireplace in the lobby of the Ojibway Hotel adjacent to the Soo locks. On the night of November 10, 1985 which was the 10th anniversary of the loss of the Fitzgerald, another severe November storm with gale force winds hit Sault Ste. Marie. Power was lost in the area. When power was restored, the night clerk at the Obijway saw that the painting was gone! The next day, technicians from Consumer's Power analyzed the power outage, compared it to the electrical grid, and found that such an outage was impossible!

Why did the power fail? Where is Pat Norton's painting? It has never emerged in any secondary art market. Older folks in the Soo still recall and can confirm the accuracy of this strange event.





Figure 1. Probable tracklines of SS EDMUND FITZGERALD and SS ARTHUR M. ANDERSON on November 10, 1975.

Education Officer's Message Cdr. Ron Schwartz, SN



This is from Kalamazoo Sail and Power Squadron's November issue of The Pilot:

At the Fall District 9 Conference, we heard about lots of changes coming from the United States Power Squadrons. USPS had 840 people take the ABC course online last year. The ABC exam is going online; persons taking the online course will no longer need to meet with a local squadron to take a proctored exam.

Other Changes: USPS is changing the navigation software included with ABC, Piloting and other courses from RosePoint to CPN.

USPS is considering changing names of courses to make them more appealing. Example: Boat Handling instead of Seamanship.

USPS is developing 18 educational videos by 2017. Hoping to expand webinars to 6 topics, which will be available online for up to one year after you pay for it.

In a survey of USPS online students 85% said they'd like to take courses in a classroom, 65% want onthe-water training. Students want short videos on specific topics instead of 12 week long courses.

Please look at the variety of boating topics we offer at United States Power Squadron's web site, www.usps.org If you have a desire to enhance and share your knowledge in any boating subject, please let me know. We can probably get others to share the teaching responsibilities. It's fun to teach and learn. Please send (aapsclasses@aoL.com) a list of the USPS courses and seminars that you want to study during the next 5 years, so we can plan and advertise these and attract more students. USPS offers On-the-water training, and certification for Inland and Coastal Navigation. If you are interested in this, please call me 734-769-3476.

Our basic boating course - ABC (Americas Boating Course) is a 16 hour course that covers Michigan boating laws, required equipment, charts and navigation. We need someone to be the chairman of our ABC course.

On-Line seminars are now available -- developed by USPS and BoatU.S. Weather for Boaters, Partner in Command, Boating on Rivers, Locks and Lakes, and Crossing Borders. http://www.usps.org/national/eddept/promos/quimby-ad-finals. jpg or http://www.boatus.org/course-preview/pic/index.html

We have a variety of 2 hour seminars to choose from with no exams, just pure pleasure. We will offer some of these if we have students interested. See http://www.usps.org/e_stuff/seminars.htm

Even though this year's boating season is coming to a close, you can continue your boating education at home. On line courses are available from our national web site http://www.usps.org/edonline/ and you can preview classes before signing up. A few topics are Weather for Boaters, All About Marine Radios, and Boating on Rivers, Locks and Lakes. Treat your family and friends to the Partner in Command course, which means all of your crew will be safer on the water next year. The cost of an on-line course is \$24.95, but members of the United States Power Squadrons get a 20% discount.
