Our Administrative Officers have programs lined up for the first half of 2018 and reservations at the Carlyle Grill.


Notice: We are not having a February General Meeting this year because almost half of our regular attendees will be out of town.

Readers of this column know that I enjoy describing events on the Great Lakes. Canadian Pacific Railway's *S. S. Assiniboia* was built in Scotland around 1900 for passenger and freight service between Port McNicoll on the eastern shore of Georgian Bay and Port William (now Thunder Bay) on the northern shore of Lake Superior. This 2.5 day voyage along with her sister ship, the *S.S. Keewatin* was specifically responsible for the economic development of Alberta and Saskatchewan that brought them into the Canadian Confederation in 1905. The two ships provided a comfortable route for passengers across Canada; train from Toronto to Port McNicoll, then overnight passage, onward by rail from Fort William. Their route required locks passage at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario in each direction.


On June 9, 1909, *Assiniboia* entered the Canadian lock downbound and made fast to the wall. The upper gates remained open as the ore carrier *Crescent City* also entered the lock. Meanwhile, the *Percy G. Walker* approached the closed lower gates to await the two downbound vessels to lock through. The Walker's captain placed the Chadburn in full reserve in order to stop along side the wall. But the Engineer misread the signal, put the engine in full ahead, resulting in a collision and fracture of the lower lock gates. The rush of water forced the Walker sideways; Assiniboia ripped out the bullards, cascaded down, collided with the Walker, then went to anchor. In spite of this mad scene, injuries were minor. An emergency gate was then lowered so that repairs could be made to the badly damaged locks.

Imagine two passengers on the Assiniboia saying to each other; "Regina, that was so exciting, I did not know that locking was so quick, I can't wait to tell Angus."

One picture is a photograph of a mural by Parks Canada at the locks which shows the event with water running freely from Lake Superior into the St. Mary's River. The other is the Assiniboia from my own collection. However, no Great Lakes captain would ever need a tug in good weather; also a flag is never placed on the steering pole at the bow.
